

Religion and Worldviews - Learning Outside the Classroom at Mount Zion

We offer a range of learning outside the classroom (LOtC) taught sessions and activities at Mount Zion. These address several areas of the National Curriculum and SMSC. However, a visit may form a particularly useful part of a school's religious education and worldviews curriculum (RWV), providing an authentic experience of a continuing religious presence in the community. RWV at Mount Zion addresses the content of the 2024 West Yorkshire Agreed Syllabus of Religious Education 'Believing and Belonging in West Yorkshire' (BBIWY). It covers the six pathways identified in the syllabus:

- 1. The nature of religion and belief;
- 2. Expressing belief;
- 3. Living a good life;
- 4. Personal journeys;
- 5. Influence and authority;
- 6. The big picture.

No presumptions are made as to the religious belonging or beliefs of visiting children and/or adults. We value diversity and take an inclusive, interpretive approach, encouraging individuals to share their own ideas and experiences with others.



We encourage pupils to develop positive attitudes to religion and the beliefs and values of others, developing, self-awareness, respect for all, open-mindedness, appreciation and wonder. Our RWV provision is rich and varied and through an interpretive, enquiry-based approach engages children, making links between the beliefs, practices and value systems of a range of faiths and worldviews. A visit to Mount Zion addresses BBIWY's emphasises on the importance of RWV reflecting the *local context* and children and young people 'encountering the lived experience of people in order to understand diversity within religions and worldviews'. As a result of a visit to Mount Zion children should:

- Know more about Christianity (particularly Methodism) as a living world faith, core beliefs, the importance of the Bible and how these impact on the belief, practice and daily lives of Christians.
- Acquire new knowledge and understanding of a range of religions and worldviews appreciating diversity, continuity and change.
- Recognise connections between their growing understanding of religion, their own lives, the wider world and human experience.
- Appreciate the influence of religion on Britain's historical, social, and cultural heritage and its impact on the lives of individuals and groups over time.

Themes

To achieve this Mount Zion offers a number of themed workshops which are differentiated according to Key Stage. We encourage schools to choose from our menu of provision (see pages 3 to 6) but we will endeavour to meet any specific requirements if possible.

Year 10-11, sessions may be geared towards the syllabus (see below), or the topic being studied for GCSE. Mount Zion provides the perfect setting to explore big questions (many of which Methodists have grappled with and attempted to address over the last 250 years). For example:

- How do people work for peace around the world? (Pathway 3)
- What are human rights and what do religious groups say about them? (Pathway 5)
- How can people work together to tackle extremism? (Pathway 5)
- How can we make the world a fairer place for all? (Pathway 3)
- Is there a connection between religion, citizenship and the state? (Pathway 5)
- How do different faiths live, coexist or work together? (Pathway 1 and 6)
- How is diversity evident in Christian and Muslim thought? (Pathway 1 and 6).

Please note:

Visit content and activities are differentiated according to key stage.

A visit/session duration is usually 1 hour, 45 minutes.

All visits are planned and led by a qualified teacher; all volunteers have an enhanced DBS.
